

How to plant native tree

- Keep roots moist until planted
- Do not prune for first year
- Dig a hole 2-3x larger than the root ball
- Cover all roots with soil and avoid air pockets
- Water 1x daily for the first 2-3 weeks then 1x weekly for the first year
- Do not add fertilizer, potting soil, or chemicals
- Do not add leaf litter
